19 Kings Road (off Hampton Road), Jane & John Bellamy

Once part of an orchard, this garden is, at first sight, a typical long narrow suburban garden, but a surprising vista opens out as you walk down it. Recently redesigned and rejuvenated, the garden contains a variety of shrubs and trees, a small vegetable patch, raspberry canes and gooseberry bushes.

Alma Cottage, 5 Albert Road (off Park Road), Dick & Gilly Hughes

A walled garden, first laid out in 1854 by the owner, a gardener from Chiswick. Some of the original layout has been retained, currently planted with fruit trees, grapevines and shrubs. There is an air raid shelter, a pirate's castle for supervised 4-7 year olds and a pond. Some local maps will be on display.

The Powder Rooms, 69-71 Broad Street (on railway bridge), Sam Kamleh Our Summer Exhibition is taking place from Friday 5th June until the end of August, and the gallery will open specially for Teddington in Flower. We are hoping to include some wonderful and varied work that includes floral arrangements as well as more loose connections with the fruitfulness of summer.

18 & 20 Teddington Park (off Waldegrave Road), Alan Drake and Helga & Mike Foss The Heavenly Twins! Once again, No.18 offers a billiard-table lawn, a carnival of topiary and a riot of colour. No. 20 has tadpoles

29 Elmfield Avenue (off High Street), Jill & Paul Smith

40 Udney Park Road (off High Street), Shirley Meaker

When we came here 40 years ago, there was just a field with 2 pear trees and a hammock! Now it has been transformed into a well stocked garden with a new pond and a living roof on the shed.

This 'secret garden' is a real treasure. Among its many features is a pond where newts and a pair of mallards have made their home, a woodland area with foxgloves, red campion and wild garlic, and a living willow arbour. 58 Munster Road (off Kingston Road), June & Pat Walsh

An unusually large garden, comprising a patio, borders with a wide variety of mature shrubs and lawn interspersed with planted raised beds. There is also a small orchard area, greenhouses and a large vegetable patch. There are no paths in the garden so the grass will be wet if the weather has been poor.

123 Munster Road (off Kingston Road), Jillian White

This is a small patio garden featuring clematis, lilies, ferns and lots and lots of pots, and there is also a small raised pond.

20 Cloister Close, Langham Road (under archway next to Church Hall), Elaine Lang

Paradise on a postage stamp! Among the flats of Cloister Close, a tiny slice of tranquillity awaits under the Gothic backdrop of the Landmark Arts Centre, with a quirky fusion of Zen and Celtic influences.
